Four Community Consultations were held in the Community as well as face to face discussions with people with lived experience. Invitations were send out to specific population groups and for the community-wide consultation a media release advertised the date and time as well. 137 people were involved in the consultations and through facilitated discussions, successes, challenges, and priorities were identified. CAB members sit on the GAPOS committee. An annual Homeless Connect day is held at the Grande Prairie Friendship Center in conjunction with community service providers and the Community Entity.

Results

With renewal, the HPS is increasing the focus on achieving results. All projects are expected to contribute to reducing or preventing homelessness and CABs and CEs should be working together to determine how they will measure project success. The HPS has identified a number of indicators it will be using to measure the success of the HPS at reducing and preventing homelessness.

Description of your Priorities

Housing First (HF) Priority

Rationale

Why is this a priority for your community? If the priority was identified in another related plan or planning process, please identify it.

Housing first is a priority in the first year of the community plan as the need has been identified for permanent supports housing (PSH) for chronic and episodically homeless individuals. The identified need is for people with mental health, addictions, FASD, and issues such as hoarding to have longer term support than the 12-18 months available through the provincial OSSI funded programs. Housing first has been identified in the Alberta 10 year plan to end homelessness, and currently our city has 3 housing first case management teams working with chronic and episodically homeless. The gap has been a lack of permanent supportive housing teams in one building with evening and weekend support.

What other resources can you leverage to contribute to your HF efforts?

HF Readiness

Alberta Works has designated two Career and Employment counsellors to the Homeless Initiatives and provide quick access for income supports and needs assessments.

Client Intake & Assessment

The provincial OSSI initiative, funds a Centralized Intake and Assessment team that provides one point of service for assessment, for housing and support needs for people experiencing homelessness or who are at imminent risk of being homeless.

Connecting to and Maintaining Permanent Housing

The Grande Spirit Foundation in the city has 61 family housing units for direct rental as social housing and an additional 427 rental supplements within the municipality. Housing fist clients have equal opportunity to apply when a housing unit or subsidy comes available. The current stock of affordable housing options in the municipality is 447 units. 64 new units came on stream in 2014.

Accessing Services

3 Housing First teams are funded through provincial OSSI funding. A team consists of one team lead and 3-4 case managers. One team is a Rapid Re-

housing team (3-4 months) and two are Intensive Case Management teams (12-18 months).

Data, Tracking & Monitoring

Provincially, data is tracked through a data system called Efforts to Outcomes. The homeless shelter and youth emergency shelter are both now as of this year using the same data collection system. One local agency has developed a logic model and outcomes that are now being used to show outcomes and successes. This agency has agreed to share the logic model tool with other service providers for consistency of data collection.

Description of the Housing First (HF) Approach

Please describe your Housing First approach, identify what percentage of your allocation will be used towards furnishing and repairing housing for HF purposes and provide a timeline for HF implementation.

Chronic and episodically homeless individuals are assessed through centralized intake and assessment and then assigned an agency case management team to provide intensive case management services for 12-18 months. The goal is to successfully graduate individuals with supports in place to maintain their housing. This process is funded through the province of Alberta. HPS funding in the community plan for 2014-2015 will provide a permanent supportive case management team to work with individuals on a longer term basis. It has been identified that there is a percentage of chronic and episodically homeless individuals that cycle back into homelessness without on going long term supports. When an individual has received supports through the provincial housing first program and has been identified as needing PSH, a transfer to the HPS team is done through consultations and meetings. 0% will be used towards capital.

Timelines: PSH team consisting of 1 team lead, 2.5 case managers hired and in place by April 15, 2014 Community referrals and transfers from provincial housing first teams take place. Maximum 45 clients PSH team in place until March 31, 2015. RFP will go out to the community in the spring of 2015 for a PSH team to be funded through provincial funding and increase the team to 4 case managers and a case load of 80 based on community need.

Individualized Services Priority

Rationale

Why is this a priority for your community? If the priority was identified in another related plan or planning process, please identify it.

Reducing homelessness by improving the self sufficiency of homeless individuals and families and those at imminent risk of homelessness, is an identified priority in our community. Grande Prairie as a city has a population of apx 70,000 people. It is located in the heart of a regional service center for the northern Alberta oil and gas industry. As a regional service hub, city-based companies service oil and natural gas activities in northwestern Alberta, northwestern British Columbia and into the Northwest Territories. This massive market aids in huge worker migration to the area in times of oil and gas production increases. People come from other provinces where there is limited employment looking for work. Many arrive with little start-up money and no place to live. This results is high shelter occupancy rates, low vacancy rates, and rental rates increased. CMHC stated in their spring 2014 rental market report the vacancy rate in Grande Prairie was 0.09% and Grande Prairie had the highest increase of 9% in rental rates. The priority for housing loss prevention services and emergency funding for basic and urgent needs has become apparent with the high number of people requesting support. This has been identified through the provincial housing first teams as a need as someone who is not chronic or episodically homeless does not fit the housing first program.
